CHOIRS OF ST JOHN'S CATHEDRAL

Directed by Roger Sayer with Organist Andrej Kouznetsov

DIRECTOR – ROGER SAYER

Roger Sayer is at the forefront of British choral and organ music. A former organ student at St Paul's Cathedral, Sayer was Prize Winner at the 1989 St Albans International Organ Competition and won all the organ prizes at the Royal College of Music. Since then, he has been constantly in demand both as a recitalist and accompanist and his playing takes him to many parts of the world. His recent and upcoming highlights include recitals in Italy, Germany, Holland and Denmark, a major tour of Australia, a live recital at Temple Church broadcast on BBC Radio 3, opening the 2018 Summer Organ Festival at Westminster Abbey and the release of two new recordings for Priory and Signum records.

Roger Sayer's work as organist has also extended into the film world, with his most recent performance as organ soloist for Hans Zimmer's Oscar nominated score for the motion picture Interstellar. Sayer later went on to perform the work live with composer Hans Zimmer in a special concert at London's Royal Albert Hall, which was attended by the film's director, cast and supporters, including Christopher Nolan, Jessica Chastain, Professor Brian Cox and Professor Stephen Hawking.

In addition, Roger Sayer is also an acclaimed Choral Director with some of the UK's finest choirs. After founding the Rochester Cathedral Girls choir, Sayer joined Temple Church in 2013 as Musical Director and has since created an impressive portfolio of recordings, broadcasts and concerts. Under his direction, Temple Church Choir has broadcast over thirteen times on BBC Radio 3 and Classic FM and undertaken several international tours of the USA, Holland, Singapore, Australia and Germany. In the summer of 2017, Roger conducted the choir at the St Albans International Organ Festival 'Three Choirs' concert, alongside the choirs of St Paul's Cathedral and St Albans Abbey. Sayer also recently initiated a new youth choir of Boys and Girls at Temple Church, which gave its debut in November 2017.

Outside of Temple Church, Roger Sayer works regularly with the London Symphony Chorus. In his capacity as Accompanist and Deputy Chorus Director, Sayer has collaborated with many of the worlds leading conductors and soloist.

ORGANIST – ANDREJ KOUZNETSOV

Andrej Kouznetsov studied at the Sydney Conservatorium of Music with Philip Swanton. While a student there he won several awards, including that of first place in the open section of the Sydney Organ Competition. During this time, he was Organ Scholar at the University of Sydney, and at St James', King Street, where he was subsequently appointed Organist.

Relocating to the United Kingdom in 2010, Andrej spent a year as Organ Scholar at Salisbury Cathedral, where he was also Director of the Cathedral Chamber Choir. Following this, he was appointed Organ Scholar at Westminster Abbey in London, where he regularly accompanied and conducted the Abbey's world-renowned choir, gave numerous recitals, and took part in high-profile events attended by Her Majesty the Queen and other members of the Royal Family. Whilst based in London, Andrej studied with Birmingham City Organist, Thomas Trotter.

Andrej is currently Assistant Director of Music at St John's Cathedral, Brisbane. Last year, Andrej was admitted as a Fellow of the Royal College of Organists.

Nicholas Jackson (1934 - 1971)

Sir Nicholas Jackson, 3rd Baronet, was born in London in 1934, the grandson of the architect Sir T.G. Jackson, who had designed many well-known landmarks in Oxford, such as the Bridge of Sighs. Nicholas studied at Oxford and the Royal Academy of Music with C.H. Trevor, George Malcolm, and Gustav Leonhardt. In 1964 he made his debut as a harpsichordist at the Wigmore Hall playing Bach's harpsichord concertos with his own chamber orchestra, the Concertante of London, which made several recordings. He was organist at St James', Piccadilly and St Lawrence Jewry-next-Guildhall in London, and between 1977 and 1984 held the position of Organist and Master of the Choristers at St David's Cathedral in Wales. In 1987, he became director of a Bach Festival at the monastery of Santes Creus in Spain, in which he would perform annually, both on his own and with his chamber orchestra. As a composer, Jackson has written sacred choral and organ music, and an opera The Reluctant Highwayman. Much of his music is in a modern-romantic style, highly influenced by French composers such as Langlais, Messiaen and Duruflé.

As a young man, Jackson was a regular visitor to the Parisian organ lofts of Notre Dame, St Clotilde and St Sulpice, where he observed organists such as André Marchal, Pierre Cochereau, and Jean Langlais improvise for services. While attending an organ recital at Notre Dame in 1971, Jackson met a French girl, Nadia, who would later become his wife. He recalls that the Organ Sonata, composed in 1985 and dedicated to Nadia, was inspired by memories of Marcel Dupré improvising at St Sulpice shortly before his death in 1971.

MUSIC AT ST JOHN'S

Music plays an important role in the life of St John's Cathedral. There are five choirs, who lead us in worship each Sunday of the year (except in January), and at additional services during the week.

Details of our Organ Recital Series and of the upcoming visit by St Andrew's Cathedral Choir from Sydney are available on the cathedral website.

At the centre of our music programme is the Cathedral Choir, which sings at most of our choral services. The treble line is formed of boy choristers, who receive a half scholarship to the Anglican Church Grammar School ('Churchie'), and benefit from a musical training that is second to none. The lower parts are sung by adult Lay Clerks, a group of singers who hold a variety of occupations: professional musicians, students, teachers, lawyers and many more.

The Cathedral Singers are a voluntary, mixed-voice choir who mainly sing at Evensong, in alternation with the Cathedral Choir. They also sing for occasional special services and concerts. Rehearsals take place on alternate Sunday afternoons, before Evensong.

The Cathedral's newly-formed Girls' Choir, directed by Kathryn Morton, offers girls aged 9 to 14 the opportunity to develop their musicianship amongst a group of like-minded peers. They share in the musical and liturgical life of the Cathedral, singing a number of services on their own, with the Cathedral Singers, and with the Lay Clerks of the Cathedral Choir.

The Cathedral Chamber Choir, also known more widely in the community as the Brisbane Chamber Choir, is an auditioned ensemble of up to twenty singers. They sing occasional services at the Cathedral, and present a number of exciting concerts throughout the year.

The Johannine Voices, directed by the Cathedral's Assistant Director of Music Andrej Kouznetsov, are a small group of about eight singers whose repertoire comprises a variety of musical styles, with a particular emphasis on Renaissance polyphony. They sing at the Liturgy of Tenebrae in Holy Week, at Mass for a number of feast days during the week, and other services.

ADVENT CANTATA (2017)

Dan Walker (1978 -)

Composer, conductor and performer **Dan Walker** is one of Australia's most in-demand choral specialists. His compositional output includes commissions for Gondwana Voices, the Queensland Symphony Orchestra, Leichhardt Espresso Chorus, Voyces Youth Choir, the Birralee Blokes, the Nittany Valley Children's Choir of Pennsylvania, and Halcyon. Recently, his large work, Mass of Deliverance was a finalist of the 2015 APRA/ AMCOS Art Music Awards.

Dan is an also active arranger and regularly produces work for the Sydney Symphony Orchestra, Hong Kong Philharmonic Orchestra, the Australian Chamber Orchestra and record label ABC Classics. His work for television includes the iconic 2009 I Still Call Australia Home advertising campaign for Qantas.

As a performer, Dan is a member of the Consort of Melbourne, St James Old Cathedral Singers, Sydney-based Cantillation, Pinchgut Opera and was a founding member of early music ensemble 'The Parson's Affayre'. He is a keenly sought-after conductor, having appeared as chorus-master for Cantillation, the Sydney Symphony and Melbourne Symphony Orchestras. He is currently Artistic Director of Choristry, a 30-voice chamber choir and Habeas Chorus, the choir for the Melbourne legal community.

BIOGRAPHIES

The **Brisbane Chamber Choir** is an auditioned vocal ensemble of up to twenty singers, established in 1997 and based in Brisbane, Australia. Under founding musical director Graeme Morton AM, it performs music of all styles and periods with a focus on Australian premiere performances and works of Australian composers. For more than 20 years the ensemble has delighted concert audiences at home and across Australian and has produced several landmark recordings.

In 2014 they were guest artists of Musica Viva in Sydney and collaborated with cornerstone Australian choral ensembles, the Adelaide Chamber Singers and the Sydney Chamber Choir, in A Tale of Three Cities in 2015. The ensemble regularly performs with leading instrumentalists including Camerata, the Badinerie Players, and The Adina String Quartet. In 2016, they released Mass of the Dreaming, a celebrated recording of Australian choral music, featuring the premier recording of the Ross Edwards' title work, together with compositions of musical friends Joseph Twist, Paul Stanhope, and Keren Terpstra. In their 20th anniversary year, the ensemble was privileged to work with the Queensland Symphony Orchestra under maestro Stephen Layton in a performance of J.S. Bach's Mass in B Minor – since broadcast twice on ABC Classic FM – and share the concert platform with internationally renown saxophonist, Diana Tolmie.

The Brisbane Chamber Choir regularly commissions works and is currently the resident Chamber Choir of St John's Anglican Cathedral.

The **University of Queensland Chambers Singers** draws young vocal artists from across the university to perform a diverse range of repertoire in a specialist vocal ensemble. Under the direction of Graeme Morton, Choral Fellow at the School of Music and Director of Music at St John's Anglican Cathedral, Brisbane, the ensemble has a traditional choral repertoire and also a focus on contemporary choral music including that of Australian composers. The UQ Chamber Singers regularly collaborate with other musicians and contribute to research projects within the university.

The Ensemble has performed in the Red Box (South Bank) as part of the Queensland Festival of Music, and at the University of Queensland's Art Museum, Nickson Room and Customs House, as well as regular performances at St John's Cathedral. Regional tours (such as to Cairns, Innisfail, and Toowoomba) support the university's engagement with local communities, and the group's research involvement extends from the canonic material from the early Renaissance, to commissions and recent compositions. Recent premieres include Finest Hour, a speech melody work commissioned from the UQ School of Music Senior Lecturer in Composition, Dr Robert Davidson.

In 2017 the ensemble performed an unusual double bill, performing Bach's monumental B Minor Mass with the Brisbane Chamber Choir and the Queensland Symphony Orchestra directed by Stephen Layton. One week later they performed the St Matthew Passion together with other vocal students from the School of Music and UQ's Pulse Chamber Orchestra, directed by Patrick Murphy. The choir has been broadcast on ABC Classic FM and 4MBS Classic FM.

Kathryn Morton is highly regarded as a choral conductor, vocal coach and speech pathologist with a passion for vocal pedagogy. With degrees in music and speech pathology from the university of Queensland, she is the Director of the St Peters Chorale at St Peters Lutheran College as well as the senior vocal tutor at St John's Cathedral. She is also the Director of the newly formed Girl Chorister choir at St John's Cathedral. These roles require her to work directly with the boy trebles and girl choristers in helping them develop their voice to manage the demands of being a Cathedral Chorister. Her choirs have performed overseas throughout England, Wales, Germany, France and Austria as well as throughout Australia to great acclaim.

As a vocal coach, Kathryn's students have prepared for successful entry into tertiary music institutions as well as international festivals. Kathryn has lectured in voice at the international music festival Tutti World Youth Music Beijing, and has also worked as an occasional tutor at the University of Queensland. She is an occasional director of the Brisbane Chamber Choir, having toured with them nationally as well as working with organisations such as the Royal School of Church Music.

Adam Broit is a singer of much renowned and is consistently found in Brisbane's finest synagogues and churches upholding an extremely high musical standard. When his engineering cape retires at the end of each day, he starts work with his passion for all types of music. For more than 15 years Adam has sung with Graeme Morton and considers St John's Cathedral to be his favourite place to perform.

Graeme Morton AM is the founding Director of the Brisbane Chamber Choir.

He is a Senior Lecturer and Choral Conducting Fellow at the University of Queensland and the Director of Music at St John's Anglican Cathedral, Brisbane. For twenty-five years was Director of Music at St Peters Lutheran College, where he founded the renowned St Peters Chorale. During this time, he co-founded The Australian Voices with Stephen Leek and served as its inaugural Director.

Never tiring to pursue exciting new choral works for his singers and their audiences alike, Graeme is responsible for commissioning and recording many works now regarded as Australian choral classics. He tours and lectures on choral conducting, both in Australia and overseas. As a Churchill Fellow he observed choral leadership in both the United States and Canada.

He is a Fellow of the Royal School of Church Music and received a Prime Minister's Medal and in 2011 was the recipient of the Lord Mayor's Australia Day Cultural Award. Graeme holds a Master of Music (Organ) from the University of Queensland, and as a composer, is published by Augsburg Fortress, Kjos Music, and Morton Music.
